From the Chair

I am not sure I have always been a good listener, and I certainly have my own opinions. But all in all, I can look around at any Cursillo event, or at Secretariat meetings and Servant Community meetings, and we have people working well together who probably don't agree on the issues that have split our diocese so disastrously. We care about each other as a community and as individuals. To me, that is what is important right now.

"When I was a child, I spoke as a child. I understood as a child, I thought as a child; but when I became a man, I put away childish things. For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know, in part, but then I shall know just as I am known. And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love." 1 Corinthians 13:11-13

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Witness Talk – February 16, 2008

When I was asked to deliver this witness talk I wanted to know the subject of the talk and I was told – what have you been doing for Jesus, what is your apostolic action? What have you done recently, what are you planning to do?

At work, with my family and in the world....

First off – the word apostolic really set me thinking.... I know I am a follower of Christ's but can I consider anything that I do apostolic?

I do believe that Christ has a central place in my life and I could not and will not be separated from the love of Christ. That is a basic tenet for me and I hope that it is for others at home and at work.

The connection to Christ and keeping Christ in our lives –

St. David's has a song that we created a few years ago... Christ at our Center – taking Christ to the World. I want to fulfill these words. A person cannot/should not separate their religious identity from their work/world identity. AND if you do it could lead to some serious therapy issues.

I bring God with me to work every day(my computer login is JCHMGM) I update this login to keep my actions and involvement with Christ intentional at work. Every time I come back to my computer I have to ask Jesus Christ to help me and guide me with whatever I am about to do. I take Christ with me when I travel and to every meeting I attend. (sometimes I bring God quietly with me and other times, I boldly declare God's presence). During the quiet times, I hold his hand as I walk down the hall to a stressful meeting. Or sing my reassuring songs of faith while traveling.

I have a friend who sings spirituals when really nervous... like when we took the wrong exit in St. Louis and were briefly in a not so safe part of town....I knew we were in trouble when he started singing ... *Go Down Moses.... Let my people go.*

My outward expression – besides my smile, is my DOK cross. I proudly wear it and will share my religion when asked about the cross telling folks that I am in a women's religious order the Daughters of the King...now that gets some weird looks. I quickly reassure them that I am not a nun. I describe the balanced cross and repeat the words inscribed, "with heart, mind and soul, uphold and bear the cross." We all have our crosses to bear and Jesus asks us to bear ours quietly and help others to bear theirs. 99.9% of the time my interactions are positive when I carry Christ with me.

My daughter put this saying on our refrigerator: "Be kinder than necessary, everyone is fighting some kind of personal battle."

Those words always give me pause to love others a little extra and pray for them rather than get upset, disappointed or angry with them. Now I know this will sound a silly or little like Pollyanna to many of you, but when someone cuts me off in traffic, I think, that poor person, someone must need them at the hospital. That may not be true but it helps turn my negative feelings at least into neutral feelings. When someone is just down right rude or mean to me, I think; wow, their feet must really hurt. Jesus would want my response to be with love and not return meanness with a mean spirited response.

I try to say a prayer prior to meeting with individuals. "Lord surround me with love and support. Allow me to look with love at this person, without judgment or prejudice. Help me adopt a calm and soothing attitude." "Lord you have given me many gifts and talents, please help me not to screw up." I have several prayers on display around my desk, in my day planner and knitted in my heart. Singing prayers in my head also helps. *Lord make my heart be good soil.....*

How can I bring God into every action... by incorporating God into everything I say, do and with my responses to the world around me. I must make my decisions based on my Christian ethics. I cannot do something unjust and call myself a Christian. Fortunately I have never been asked to compromise my principles. I have had to tell people things they don't want to hear and give bad news. I hope that my Christian spirit always flows through and around every interaction. You can be firm and kind. Provide correction and support with a caring/supportive/loving attitude. I am not the Christian "weirdo" but rather the nice Christian lady that is reliable and trustworthy. I want to be someone that can be relied upon regardless of the circumstances. My love for others is not conditional. They do not have to be a Christian for me to care about them and their family as well as the entire world. I strive to be Joy, a person who has a kind word and look for everyone, not just the chosen few.

Do I go out and evangelize? YES, Every day and every minute.

I am a soldier for Jesus. I put on the armor of Christ because we never know when the opportunity to witness will occur. When, we might be able to reach across the chasm that separates us from another person. We never know who we will encounter or what their secret burden, trial, or personal misery might be. A smile can and does brighten a day but stopping to ask a question and then listen for the answer is even better. In our baptismal vows we are commanded to love and serve everyone. We must love everyone just as Christ loves everyone. The love doesn't have to be the same for all. Sometime what we can offer is our presence, our resources and our prayers on their behalf, our ability to listen, our compassion or our time. Our best response to this call to service and action on behalf of Christ is: I will with God's help.

"Inasmuch as you have done it unto the least of these my children you have done it unto me." I hope that I am blessed and guided to continue to love and serve in Christ's army.

Lord let me be your servant and a servant to others. As the DOK motto states, which I believe captures the apostolic spirit, and it is that I wish to share with the world.

Group Reunion is Essential to Me!

I have met weekly with one group reunion since November 1986. Twenty -two years equals approximately 1100 groupings. Have I missed some? Yes, when I have been out of town or sick. So I have attended about 1080. Clearly, grouping is an essential part of my life. It is essential because I need someone to hold me accountable for my Christian piety, study, and action. I need a Christian community, in addition to my church, who loves me and does not judge me. I need to know I can depend on them for almost anything - and I have. I need prayer warriors who are praying for me every single day. And I need their help to stay focused on Jesus. I need to be able to share a few things that I cannot share with others, including my priest, or my family. We share what we have done for Jesus and what we have not done. We have two clergy in our group! We have people in special ministries such as prayer chains and Kairos. Despite differences in theology, we are deeply spiritual.

Small groups make things happen. Through the Holy Spirit, we have worked together to bring people to Christ. We have witnessed to our faith through praying, words, and actions in public restaurants for over 20 years. We have grouped with men and women. We have prayed for our servers. They have prayed for us, even if not Christian! We have served on Curillo weekends together. We have provided Christian literature to employees in the restaurant. And we have been strengthened in our group to be witnesses for Jesus in the rest of the world.

In addition to that, I group with another Christian brother through email and have for a number of years. We share deeply about so many things. Yet we still maintain the discipline of piety, study, and action!
