The Theology of the Cursillo Weekend by our Cursillo President

The Cursillo Team is working under the leadership of Rectora Rosaura (Rosie) Medina to prepare for the upcoming Cursillo Weekend #149 at the Pine Valley Bible Conference Center on April 27-30. As each team member prayerfully fulfills the role and responsibilities to which we have committed to bring the message of Christ's love and redemption, we reflect on the theology that guides the flow and structure of the Cursillo Weekend. The Episcopal Cursillo Ministry provides the team with many valuable resources to facilitate our tasks so that each component of the Weekend reflects the deeper meaning and purpose of Cursillo. A guide titled "The CursilloPath" tells us that the Cursillo Method may up summed up with these words: "Cursillo seeks to enable us to live out our Baptismal Covenant." The Cursillo literature emphasizes the reason for our commitment to the Ministry is that"... by virtue of our baptism, we share a call to be witnesses of new life in Christ."

The heart of the Cursillo Weekend is fifteen talks (rollos), five meditations, and daily Eucharist. Ten team members are called to prepare the lay talks for the Weekend. Each rollo follows the outline given in the Talk Workbooks to ensure that its content adheres to the theological integrity of the Weekend through the personal witnessing of the team member about his or her walk with Christ. Selected team members critique the rollos support the Rollista to provide a presentation of Scripture and witnessing to share our responses to Christ's call to each one of us.


Each Rollo has a message that contributes to the grand narrative of the Weekend in such a way as to retain the traditions of Cursillo, as well as to prompt table discussions that lead the Candidates to share and experience Christ's love and healing grace. The talks, meditations, and liturgy challenge each of the team members and, in turn, help the Candidates to find new ways to relate to the Gospel in their everyday lives. The Cursillo Weekend then inspires the new Cursillistas to live in the Fourth Day through Group Reunion and Ultreya, where witnessing continues to bring Christ's light into our communities of faith.

The Cursillo Path bulletin articulates the fundamental elements of the Cursillo Weekend that include "... encountering God, which entails encountering ourselves; developing a relationship with Christ; taking our place in a mutually-supportive community of brothers and sisters; and taking Apostolic responsibility for the world." The Cursillo #149 Team affirms that prayer is the foundation of our Weekend as we pray for one another and for our Candidates. We ask for prayers from the greater Cursillo community for the Holy Spirit to uplift us on the Weekend as we strive to be apostles for Jesus Christ.

#### (1) Commitment to Christ, Individual Conversion

In order to do the will of God and allow God to work in our lives, we must have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. This involves being willing to let Jesus be Lord over our lives. In other words, are you willing to give your life to Jesus? Many people are not willing to do this, and would like simply to have a little bit of spirituality or religion in their life, but they really don't want to commit themselves to Jesus. Without committing our lives to Jesus there is no individual nor inward conversion and therefore no personal relationship with Jesus. One must surrender one's life to Christ. When we have a personal relationship with Jesus, Jesus is working in our thoughts and in our emotions, and most importantly, in our will. Jesus working in our will gives us the strength to overcome negative and destructive emotions. We therefore are not held captive by our emotions. We now have freedom to say "no" to negative emotions and an ability to appreciate more deeply our positive emotions. Emotions are an important part of life, but

serving Jesus is more important. A person who accepts Jesus as Lord will do what Jesus tells them to do most of the time, rather than what their emotions tell them to do. Jesus Christ in us is the inward key to having a successful life on earth and eternal life ever after.

#### (2) Commitment to Christ's Church, Corporate Conversion.

To be a Christian, we need not only experience an inward conversion to Jesus, but we also need to outwardly convert to being in Christ's community on earth-the church. Despite the church's flawed aspects-and there are many--Jesus Christ is present and working in His church. The church has channels of grace within it. Grace is God's active favorunearned and undeserved-poured out upon us. In the church we experience God's grace through the sacraments, through the reading and preaching of God's word, and through the gifts of the Holy Spirit that are present and are working in the individuals in the church. All these are channels of God's grace that pour God's active favor into our lives helping to make successful. То us separate ourselves from the church is to separate ourselves from these channels of grace. A person unwilling to attend church believes that they can lead a better life on their own rather than by receiving God's grace. A true Christian is someone who wants to live their life by the grace of God and therefore wants to be in the church. The people in the church become channels of God's grace to guide us, to lift us up when we fall, to heal us, to show us Jesus' vision for our future. It is

essential that a Christian be both converted to Jesus and be in His church. You must experience both individual and corporate conversion to truly be a Christian.

#### (3) Commitment to Christ's Work, Becoming Christ-like by Doing the Work of Christ

The third and last conversion is when we no longer want to only receive Grace from Jesus and His church, but we want to be used by Jesus to be a channel of Grace to others by doing the work of Jesus Christ. This work may be small or big, but it is life changing for those whom we are helping. As we are used by Jesus, we become like Jesus. As we build up others, we are also built up. This process of building up is called edification—like building an edifice. Many people want the Lord to build them up but are so selfish they do not want to do the work of the Lord. We must realize that it's only in giving that we receive.

In summary, to be a true Christian we need three conversions: to Jesus, to His church, and to His work. When we have all three conversions the rest of our lives come together; there is a spiritual

harmony that develops—because we are living God's plan for us. In other words, our conversion to Christ is real and not just an idea or emotion that can fade away. When we are true followers of Jesus through the three conversions: individually, in the community of Christ, and Christ's ministries, we succeed in becoming true Christians.

I received support and freedom to explore the me that God created. I was reminded that we all have unique gifts, talents, and ways of understanding. We are all beloved children of God.

The presence of the Holy Spirit was apparent among the twenty-five cursillistas who came for fantastic food and fellowship, music, prayer and praise, inspiration, and encouragement.

Spanish and English, as well as the universal language of music united everyone to praise the Lord. Busca Primero (Seek ye First), Levantere tu Nombre (Lord I lift your Name on High), Abre mis Ojos (Open the Eyes of My Heart) were sung along with the pre-Lenten favorites, Alleluia, Halleluia, He is Coming, and Allelu.

But what made the evening especially holy were the spoken-from-the-heart Witness and Echo Talks given by the blessed couple, Rom Ituarte and Rosie Medina,

respectively. Rom and Rosie shared that though they brought up their children in the Church with faithful church attendance, prayer and a Christian Home, over the ensuing years their children fell away from the Church. Some even became atheists. This fact became evident when their son, Carlos, and his girlfriend became parents with a premature baby who was medically induced to be born after only 29 weeks of gestation. The baby suffered some dangerous health issues. Rosie and Ron immediately travelled to Phoenix to visit and support their son, the mother and the baby as best they could.

The parents of the baby were concerned and especially resisted the presence of the maternal grandmother as they were afraid that she would have the baby baptized clandestinely. Rosie and Rom made it clear to the parents that the matter of baptism was totally up to them, the parents. Nevertheless, Rosie and Rom were praying for the well-being of the baby and the mother.

The good news is that the baby's health improved, he was released from ICU, and the prognosis is good. Further, the baby's father, Carlos, admitted that even he was praying in the Chapel at the Hospital.

Rosie's echo proffered her faith that with God, nothing is impossible. She recited the various serious challenges that Rom and she experienced over the years of their life together, and that with God, each and every challenge that seemed impossible to overcome was overcome.

Fr. Ed Busch related how when he just became a Christian some 50 or so years ago, it was at a gathering much like this Ultreya with similar music and praise, and with an expectation of divine intervention and salvation. The sharing from the heart by Rom and Rosie reminded him why we come to these gatherings. And, yes, we are also reminded that with God nothing is impossible. Amen. Ultreya!


