# From our Cursillo President Jill Mora

As President of the Cursillo Secretariat, I am pleased to report that Cursillo #149 held at the Pine Valley Bible Conference Center April 28-30 was a blessed Weekend through the light of the Holy Spirit. We thank Rectora Rosaura Medina for her leadership and the #149 Team for all the work and the love that went toward making the Weekend such a life transforming experience for all of us. We also thank our clergy, Fr. Carlos García of St. Phillip the Apostle, Fr. Roberto Maldonado of St. Matthews, and the Reverend Lilia Mendoza of St. Peter and St. Paul in El Centro for their spiritual guidance and inspirational instruction, as well as their offering of grace-filled sacraments. At the Clausura. Bishop Susan Brown Snook commissioned 12 new Cursillistas who are called to serve the Lord through this blessed ministry.

One of the unique aspects of the Cursillo #149 is that it was totally bilingual. Thanks to the new translation

equipment that the Secretariat was able to procure through generous donations from the Cursillo community, the Team was able to provide simultaneous translation for Rollos and other activities on the Weekend. We were fortunate to have bilingual clergy and English-speaking and Spanish-speaking Team members and candidates, who together made the weekend an inspiring multicultural event. I am reminded of what we celebrate on Pentecost with these words from the book of the Acts of the Apostles 2:4, "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them the ability." Our cross-cultural sharing included a skit prepared by the Candidates where we were all on our feet dancing the Hokey Pokey and the Macarena. This was a joyful celebration of the universality of Christianity and Cursillo as an expression of our unity in Christ's love.

The Secretariat also wants to inform our Cursillo community of recent developments that have propelled us into making some necessary changes in our Cursillo calendar. At our first Secretariat meeting this year in February, we voted not to commit to the October Cursillo #150 contract with the Pine Valley Bible Conference Center. This decision was taken reluctantly because the PVBCC management could not accommodate our Cursillo Weekend schedule for either our Weekend beginning on Thursday or a three-day Weekend model. Consequently, we decided that it would be necessary to search for a new venue for Cursillo #150 and beyond. Another factor in our decision is the cost of the Weekend and the ways we traditionally fund our Weekends so that Cursillo is self-sustaining, through donations and the funding we receive from the Diocese. We appointed a Venue Search Committee that has met and is making progress toward locating a new facility. The Servant Community led by Sunny Landry is also working on the search for an alternative site for the Cursillo Weekends. We have set our parameters for a new venue that can accommodate us while maintaining the Weekends' theological and spiritual integrity. We ask all members of the Cursillo community for your prayers and support in this endeavor. The Secretariat hopes to be able to announce the place and dates for Cursillo #150 in early 2024 as soon as possible.

# From Our Spiritual Director The Rev. George Calvert



#### The Chosen TV Series

The Chosen TV Series is a streamed multi-episode program that combines fiction with actual biblical events to tell the story of Jesus and his apostles. It is like a skillfully written historical novel based on the four gospels. The Chosen does two things very well:

It helps you see Jesus through the eyes of those around him, not through the interpretation of the Nicene creed. I strongly believe in the creed, but we have to remember that the people during the time of Jesus knew nothing of the creed. It was written about three hundred years after the time of Jesus. In The Chosen Jesus is interpreted by the Romans as a street preacher, by Jews as a rabbi, by Jesus's followers as a prophet, and gradually by some of his followers as the Messiah, and then finally, as the son of God.

The Chosen uses fictional situations and characters to be a commentary that brings out the meaning of historical events recorded in the Biblical texts. For example, the script writers have imagined situations and conversations that the Pharisee Nicodemus would likely be engaged in. While the situations and conversations are fiction, the content of the conversations reflects what the historical Nicodemus would be

advocating. Through the fiction, we get to see an accurate picture of Nicodemus. This fictional commentary method is used skillfully to explain the personalities, motivations, and theology of Jesus's apostles and others around him. I strongly encourage you to watch The Chosen. The first episode may seem boring and confusing as new characters are being introduced, but by the second episode things become clearer and the story becomes very compelling.

You can find Season 1 of The Chosen on Netflix, Season 2 on Amazon Prime, and Season 3 on Apple TV.

I know from years of theological study that many of the things represented by the fictional situations are historically and theologically accurate. For example, a little detail, Jewish men wore beards and Roman men were clean shaven. In The Chosen Matthew is clean shaven showing that he is a Roman sympathizer who would be a pariah among his fellow Jews. When Jesus invites Matthew to follow him, he is taking a big risk. It shows how far Jesus would go to help someone follow him.



A small but enthusiastic crowd of Cursillistas gathered on the Saturday evening of May 20, 2023, at St. Philip's for fellowship, prayer, food, music and song, and inspiring witness talks. The Ultreya was blessed with a sumptuous potluck that was readily consumed by the hungry horde following Grace given by Fr. Carlos. There were no complaints.

The music led by Alex Tuttle reflected the bilingual throng, started off with "You Are Worthy of My Praise," "Amor, Poder," and "I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light." It was capped with "Paso a Paso," "Trading My Sorrows," and "Jesus, My Lord." As an integral part of the Ultreya, a Group Reunion was experienced by all in their Table Groups. The special sound of sharing and laughter filled the room for half an hour or so.

Joe Gamboa gave a witness talk that featured the importance of peace and rest in sharing Jesus with others. He admitted that he neglected to take rest to the point that he became burnt out and was overwhelmed by life events. Taking time for peace and rest increased his piety and recharged him for action.

Yahaira Garcia in her Echo Talk shared how she became inspired by the news as she observed of the plight of immigrants: she took action to help provide for the obvious needs of the immigrants. She pointed out that she was very grateful for how she could live her life and felt called to express that gratitude by helping others to improve their lives. Both talks were expressed from the heart and were impactful.

Fr. Carlos gave a scriptural response based on Jesus' passage set forth in Matthew 25. After inquiring whether anyone else wished to comment, Ruben shared that the talks showed that love is an action verb and that it is expressed by not focusing on yourself, but by willing to benefit others.

The Ultreya concluded with the joining of hands and the singing of The Lord's Prayer.

### Ideas to help you plan a Cursillo Sunday

- Announce it in your Sunday bulletin, your parish newsletter and/or include in your parish email.
- Make that Sunday's service SPECIAL.
- Request ahead of time for a "Cursillo" song to be included in the worship.
- Have a Cursillista give a short testimony of what attending a Cursillo Weekend meant to them. A recent attendee is a great choice.
- Contact the secretariat if you would like a "guest speaker" from another parish.
- Ask everyone who has attended a Cursillo to stand. It may surprise you!
- Encourage Cursillistas to wear their baloneys to church on that Sunday.
- During announcements, ask the rector to encourage people to visit the Cursillo table on the patio to learn more about Cursillo.
- Set up the table with a sign-up sheet, brochures, bookmarks, Palanca, and something sweet.
- Ask those who are interested in attending or getting involved again or serving on the weekend to leave their names and contact information.
- Follow-up (make a phone call) with anyone interested in attending a weekend, sponsoring someone, or who has more questions.

 Host a Cursillo coffee hour the following Sunday to meet other Cursillistas in your church.

This is a great opportunity to find candidates and sponsors and team members for Weekends and to connect with the Cursillistas in your parish.

#### Preamble

The purpose of Episcopal Cursillo in the United States of America is to bring Christ into our environments and thereby change the world for Christ, using the proven strategies and methods of Cursillo.

#### Strategy

To achieve this purpose, we will use Pre-Cursillo to identify active Christians having the potential to influence their environments, sending them to Three-Day weekends to renew their Christian commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptismal Covenant and to teach the Cursillo Method; and we will use Fourth Day programs to encourage Cursillistas who have completed Three-Day weekends to carry out apostolic witness in their environments.

#### Method

Cursillo empowers Cursillistas to bring Christ to the world and, through a continued commitment of a Rule of Life including Piety, Study, Action, Group Reunion, and Ultreya enables them to persevere in the Fourth Day as Ambassadors for Christ in their environments.

#### Pastoral Plan

To discern God's will for the place and vision of the Cursillo Ministry in The Episcopal Diocese of San Diego, the Secretariat members of the ministry will work under the direction of the Bishop Susan Brown Snook to undertake the following for a period of one year from this date:

#### Study our own environment:

How are we implementing the Cursillo Method?

How are we encouraging our members to live out their Fourth Day and bring Christ to their environments?

How can we attract younger participants?

How can we attract cross-cultural participants?

#### Plan and carry out our ministry in these ways:

Promote visible Cursillo support and servanthood in the Diocese and the greater community.

Continue to lead and support Ecumenical Ultreyas.

Pledge \$1,440 to the Episcopal Cursillo Ministry.

Support at least one outreach project each year.

Submit articles to be included in the Diocesan Messenger.

Hospitality Support for the Annual Leadership Academy and Diocesan Convention.

Continue to Recruit and Train Parish Representatives

Continue the goal of eight Ultreyas per year.

Encourage all Cursillistas to promote Cursillo by wearing nametags and being prepared to talk about the Cursillo Ministry on Cursillo Sunday.

Encourage participation in Cursillo activities of Group Reunion and Ultreyas.

Encourage participation in our servant community.

Encourage people to attend Cursillo Weekends, especially people in the following categories:

People in the age group of 18-49

Post-newcomers (1-3 years in a church).

Cross-cultural candidates.

Brothers and Sisters of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America.

Cursillo promotes small group ministry and Cursillo enables multi-cultural inclusion.

The Bishop will send a letter to all clergy encouraging them to attend a Cursillo weekend if they have not done so and if they have attended a Cursillo weekend to let the Secretariat know that they are Cursillistas.

New website and features fully implemented before year end.

Continue to utilize social media as a method to promote the Cursillo ministry, including online Ultreyas on YouTube.

The Bishop will encourage Clergy to attend our Weekends.

The next Cursillo Sunday will be January 21, 2024 (third Sunday).
